#### Annual Reports 2019/2020

#### **Bellringers Report**

Our Tuesday evening practices are generally well attended, and we are grateful for visitors from other towers who help us improve and broaden the scope of methods we were able to ring. We have managed to ring for every Sunday service as well as for other church services and national events, albeit sometimes with only three or four ringers.

During 2019 2 full peals and 8 quarter peals have been rung at the church. We rang two quarter peals and a full peal to welcome Ruth. We also rang to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day, the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the start of WW2, the Armistice on 11 November, and heeded the call from Archbishop Justin to toll the bells in solidarity with the people of France following the fire at Notre Dame de Paris. We also rang to mark the passing of the mother of one of our ringers on the day of her funeral (Mrs Lily Levick, mother of Alison Gerrish).

During the break in at the church on 21/22 July 2019 the robbers smashed the glass panel in the belfry door to gain access to the ringing chamber. Unfortunately money left over from the wedding on 20 July was left in the ringing room cupboard for collection by the Tower Treasurer. This was stolen (£70) and the ringing room ransacked looking for further booty. Thankfully nothing else of value was taken and they ignored the bells and roof area, so all lead roofing was still intact. Following the break in, the glass panel was replaced with wood and the key to the mortice lock on the door was found and this is now used as well as the digital lock to improve security. Extra keys for this lock have been cut and given to the church.

Most recently we rang to support the wedding event on 16 February 2020 and invited all prospective brides and grooms to visit to see the bells being rung. This was very well received and we had nearly 20 visitors come up to see us. Hopefully this will result in bells being required for more weddings in the coming year.

### **Brassey Centre Management Committee**

The year saw bookings to be similar to 2018. We lost a couple of regular hires and gained a few over the year.

How best to Advertise the Brassey Centre for Hire is under regular review, one consideration would be to have a suitably sized notice board mounted outside the Centre on the wall adjacent to the main entrance. The notice board would show the current availability during the week and weekends, it could also show activities / groups that currently use the Brassey Centre, with days and times shown for those viewing the notice board who might be interested in joining a particular group.

The Saturday Market continues to make donations to the church via the Brassey Centre Management.

Currently the Brassey Trust is having the inside of the Pill Box painted an appropriated lighting inside the Pill Box to be provided. When finished documents from the church office etc. will be moved and stored in the Pill Box plus items from the sheds at the rear of the Centre that are required to be kept. This will then allow the sheds to be replaced with the objective to gain more storage opportunities.

A deep clean of the Centre was organised by the Brassey Trust, with the cleaning company selected completing the task at the end of November/Beginning December 2019. Over the last 4/5 months a review of the cleaning and caretaking process has taken place. This has proved to be successful with all involved.

The Brassey Trust together with the Brassey Centre Management Committee are currently reviewing the best method of locking / Opening the Centre while ensuring it is secure.

New Boilers for the heating system within the Brassey Centre are currently being installed with suitable locks on the boiler cabinet doors to stop inappropriate tampering with the system.

The committee is aware that the monies brought in by letting Thorndyke Room etc. are not sufficient to cover the cost of renting the centre from the Brassey Trust. We endeavour to encourage new hirers but feel we should not increase our fees at present, as stated in previous reports. We must be able to compete with other halls in the area. However, hire of the Centre does provide us with a Church Office and venue for Church functions for which no fees are charged.

### **Choir Report**

As noted in last year's report, the choir had a year of rather mixed fortunes in 2018, with the launch of the new Junior Choir as a growth area, balanced by a decline in adult numbers (for a variety of reasons).

2019 has been a steadier year, with the Junior Choir (under Paul Richards' leadership) continuing to grow in confidence: Numbers attending are fairly consistent. However, adult choir numbers continue to decline – the core group is now less than ten, boosted for special occasions by auxiliary singers from other choirs.

The Junior Choir continues to make a very active contribution to the third Sunday of the month service in term-time, and particularly to the carol service. We are now over half way through the 3-year funding provided by the Ouseley Trust.

Together with the young choirs of Mereworth and West Malling, the Junior Choir will be part of a Young People's Music Festival to be held in the church on Saturday 29/2/20 — it is hoped that attendance at the culmination of this event at 5pm will be well attended by people from Aylesford, to support not just our Junior Choir, but also to encourage all the youngsters who participating!

The year got off to a busy start with the induction service for Ruth, as our new Vicar, followed within weeks by the Good Friday performance of Stainer's "The Crucifixion", with Keith Viner and Brian White as soloists. The choir has been asked to sing at a number of funerals – more in fact than the number of weddings – and the usual round of monthly anthems has kept everyone busy. Once again, Junior and adult choirs came together for the carol service.

Whilst 2020 will doubtless provide a number of challenges, we are already embarking on rehearsals for the Good Friday performance of Fauré's "Requiem", and hope that this will be well supported. Beyond the choir, we also continue to hold a small organ recital series, to raise funds for church maintenance. As noted in last year's report, attendance has been a little disappointing. Do consider attending these, as they provide a great afternoon's entertainment, right on our doorstep!

Helen's stalwart work as Assistant Organist continues, and I am very grateful for this. Paul's work with the Junior Choir continues to bear fruit, and we need to consider how this is to continue beyond mid-2021.

It remains clear that we need to recruit more adult choir members (particularly), as on occasion we do struggle to do what we would like to do, and what we have committed to do. This is not just the responsibility of the choir: We all need to provide the encouragement to others to join the church family in general, and perhaps to consider singing in the choir as an activity supporting that.

Finally, I convey my thanks for the support given to the choir and myself throughout the year by choir members, the PCC and wider congregation.
